1. Has the Human Rights Act 1998 altered the meaning of the principles of the separation of powers and the sovereignty of Parliament?
2. Should the courts accept that it is appropriate to bind a government body to the substance of a representation made by the body if the body wishes to resile from that representation and if allowing the body to do so would work a significant injustice on a citizen who has acted in reliance on the original representation?
3. Is it possible to give a coherent meaning to the rule against bias in the light of recent appellate decisions?
4. Would the law of England benefit from a wholesale or selective recognition of the general principles of law developed by the European Court of Justice as principles of English administrative law?
5. Do rules of locus standi serve any useful purpose?
6. What is meant by the concept of 'illegality' in English administrative law?
7. What criteria do the courts use to determine whether a body is amenable to judicial review and/or a public authority within s.6 of the Human Rights Act 1998?
8. Is Dicey's notion of the rule of law a helpful tool with which to explain the nature of the relationship between the citizen, the executive and the courts in the United Kingdom today?
